**APPENDIX C: COMPARING THE DEMOGRAPHICS OF THOSE ENROLLED IN  
STABLE FAMILIES WITH THOSE SERVED BY GLADDEN COMMUNITY HOUSE'S  
HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION PROGRAM**

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When one compares the heads of household served by Stable Families with the heads of household served by Gladden Community House's Prevention Program, three major differences are noted.

- **Race:** 77% of Stable Families' heads of household are Black or African American, compared to 30% of Gladden Prevention's heads of household. This difference was statistically significant.
- **Gender:** 94% of Stable Families' heads of household are female, compared to 78% of Gladden Prevention's heads of household. This difference was statistically significant.
- **Family size (average):** The average number of people in the families served by Stable Families (3.8) was larger than the average number of people in the families served by Gladden's Prevention program (2.5).<sup>1</sup>
